




y friend and I were on a tour to Morocco. It was our dream to see this fascinating African country. First we landed in Rabat, its capital. Before coming here, we had read a little about the country. It is situated at the western end of the Mediterranean Sea. Though it is not far from Europe, its look is more Eastern. The high mountains here are capped with snow in winter. Its coastline is green and beautiful. It is also a part of the biggest desert in the world, the Sahara Desert. We were struck by the beauty of the city.



After spending two days in the capital, we came to Tangier. This city is built on the slopes of chalky limestone hills. It is an important port. It has high-rise buildings, flat-topped white houses and broad roads. There are also many domes and minarets. In some parts of the city, the roads are very narrow. Here, it is difficult for a foreigner to find friendly people more easily than in Rabat. Everything here looked strange.

We found most of the men wearing hoods and long flowing gowns. Women wore veils that covered their faces. In many parts of the city, the *souks* (markets) were crowded with people. On both sides of the streets, there were tiny shops selling trinkets, souvenirs or expensive carpets.

We liked the place and started going there very often to drink coffee or mint tea. After a few days, the customers stopped looking strangely at us, though they never spoke to us and always continued playing. Two weeks later, a huge man came up to our table and said something in Arabic. At once, I called the waiter and enquired, "What is this gentleman saying?" He talked to him and said, "He is asking you to play the game of *Pachisi* with him." "What's that?" I asked him. I guessed *Pachisi* must be a word for shooting or fencing in Arabic. "That game," he said pointing at the Ludo board.

I always thought Ludo was the game for children. I immediately nodded. My friend and I stood up to join the huge man and his friend at their table. So did everyone in the coffee shop. We sat at one side of the table and the Moroccan and his friend occupied the other two seats. The rest of the people stood around us to watch the game. Some even stood on chairs so that they could see the board properly.

We won the first game (It was a game of the best of three.) They won the second. The third game was very important for both the teams. After some time, I was one place from home. I could feel the tension. Every time I rolled the dice, the audience yelled three or two in Arabic. I threw three several times, one after the other. Each time the audience yelled 'three', we yelled 'one'. My opponents were also one throw away. But they were not lucky yet. When my turn came, I tossed the dice and my buddy and I yelled 'one'. The dice spun around and stood on its side and fell. It was 'one'! The audience was wild with joy. They lifted us onto their shoulders and took us around the coffee shop and then into the *souk*. They were yelling all the time, but the only word we could understand was *Pachisi*.

We spent another week in Tangier. After the event, people became very friendly with us and invited us for meals. In the streets, kids waggled their thumbs in the air and shouted *Pachisi*. After all we were the winners. We had defeated a bully.


